Class Size: The maximum class size for most programs is set at 30 students, minimum number is 10.

Cost: There are no fees for these programs. Thank a **hunter or angler** for supporting these educational experiences.

Cancellations: Please notify us of all cancellations or adjustments that may be needed.

Chaperones: We encourage chaperones' participation to assist with supervision of students. We request a 1 to 10 ratio for all field trips.

Confirmation: Following scheduling of an Outdoor Campus Class, we will confirm with you the details and keep you updated on items to bring to the campus.

Elementary & Middle School



Animals in South Dakota



This program will be personalized to meet your classroom needs with age appropriate learning activities to learn animal identification and adaptations, management, food chains, movements and habitat. Specialized programs

can be led for bats, beavers, birds, amphibians, reptiles and insects. (1.0–2.0 hours)

Nature Track and Scat Hike

A naturalist will lead you on a hike of our trails to observe the seasonal changes. Look for signs of active wildlife by the tracks and traces they leave behind. (1.0-2.0 hours)

Going, Going, Gone

Who's disappearing from our planet and why? What's meant by the different classifications – threatened, endangered and extinct? Play a game and do activities that highlight some of South Dakota's disappearing wildlife. Learn what you can do to help. (1.5 hours)

Lewis and Clark Adventures

Two hundred years ago, Lewis and Clark made their way along the Missouri River through today's South Dakota. Come along with "Capt. Lewis" and "Capt. Clark" to learn the history and some of the skills it took to be an early explorer. Learn to navigate by magnetic compass, describe plants and find out about the animals the Corps of Discovery encountered as they went hunting and discovered what President Jefferson bought with the Louisiana Purchase.

Elementary & Middle School



Wetland Biology (Spring and Fall)

Learn all about wetlands and the important role they play in our ecosystems. Students will discover all the various species dependent on wetlands and how they help humans as well. Students will learn how human activity impacts wetlands and ways that impact is mitigated. They will also get to play a kid favorite, the habitat game!

(1-1.5 hours)



Orienteering

This is a sport that uses a detailed map to select routes while navigating through unfamiliar terrain. Orienteering will help with your students' map reading skills, concentration and the ability to make quick decisions about the best route to take. This sport can be enjoyed by a walk through the natural habitats at The Outdoor Campus or as a competitive race.

(1.0 to 1.5 hours)




Elementary & Middle School



Fishing/Ice Fishing

Fishing is another great lifetime sport that people all over South Dakota enjoy. Learn the basics of fishing, necessary equipment, casting techniques and how to bait your hook. Then try your luck fishing in our pond.

(1-1.5 hours)



Introduction to Archery

Introducing students to a lifetime sport such as archery has benefits inside and outside the classroom. This class will teach your students the basics of archery in a fun and safe environment. Getting kids active in the outdoors makes it more likely that they will serve as stewards of our state's bountiful natural resources as well. (1– 1.5 hours)

Home Is Where the Habitat Is

Get to know South Dakota's wildlife and what habitats they call home through games and hands-on activities.

Learn what wildlife and people need to survive. Go on a habitat hike outdoors and discover signs of wildlife. (1 hours)

Owls and Owl Pellet Dissection

Lean all about owls, their habitat, and their amazing adaptions that makes them the amazing predators they are. Students will also get to dissect their own owl pellet and explore all of the exciting parts that may be hidden in one. (1 hour)



High School



Fishing Basics

Get an introduction to fishing equipment, casting skills, fish species, knots, and more, then go fishing at our pond. (1-2 hours)

Fish Cleaning/Anatomy

Come learn about fish inside and out. We will go over a couple methods on how to prepare them for the frying pan, and learn about some basic fish anatomy as well. (1-2 hours)

Archery/Bow hunting

Join us as we learn all about the fascinating sport of archery and bow hunting. We will learn all about the fundamentals including safety, equipment and ethics with archery equipment. We will try your skills with 3D targets on our range. (1-1.5 hours)

BB Guns Basics/Safety

Join us as we learn basic safety, shooting positions and techniques used while shooting and hunting. Improve your accuracy with tips and tricks on how to improve your aim in a safe environment. (1-1.5 hours)

Kayak and Canoeing

Learn basic safety and paddling strokes, and then practice your new skills on our pond in canoes and kayaks. Wear sandals or shoes that can get wet. (1-1.5 hours)

Cross Country Skiing

Learn the basics of the sport, then go outdoors to practice your skills on our trails. Skis, poles and ski boots are provided by The Outdoor Campus. Must have at least 4" of good snow to ski. (1-1.5 Hours)

High School



Orienteering/Map and Compass

Learn the basics on how to read a map and use a compass. We will learn about all of the parts and tips and tricks to be able to navigate in the backcountry hunting, in orienteering meets or in adventure races.

Ice Fishing

Learn the basics of what it takes to ice fish in SD and how to do it safely. We'll talk about basic equipment, safety, and ethics before heading out to the pond and dropping a line. Bring warm winter clothes.

Snow Shoeing

Snowshoeing is a fun way to explore the outdoors in winter! Learn about appropriate clothing and technique, then hit the trails to test your skills on a trek. Wear warm clothes and waterproof boots.

Conservation History

The history of conservation in the US is an crucially important part of the world we live in today. Learn all about the different eras of wildlife management in the US from the greatest mistakes made to the greatest success stories.

Endangered Species

Students will learn all about how species become endangered, how endangered species are protected, and what endangered species we have here in South Dakota. Learn about the history of conservation in the United States and how humans impact populations and how wildlife is managed today.

Career Pathways

The natural resource field provides a ton of fun and exciting career opportunities. Learn all about what careers are possible and the pathways you can take to find a job that's right for you.

Project Wild

Project**W** This workshop will train participants to use Project Wild and Growing Up Wild curriculums. This class qualifies participants to receive resource guides and materials. These are nature-based programs that relate to South Dakota Content Standards requirements. The workshop includes classroom



instruction, an opportunity to practice activities, and engage in outdoor field experience. South Dakota Game, Fish, and Parks will provide the resources for Project Wild and are funded through hunting and fishing license fees. HuntSafe Instructor

This workshop will train participants in how to run a HuntSafe class at their school. HuntSafe is the only firearms safety course recognized in the State

MISSION STATEMENT

The South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks provides sustainable outdoor recreational opportunities through responsible management of our state's parks, fisheries and wildlife by fostering partnerships, cultivating stewardship and safely connecting people with the outdoors.



How are these classes FREE?

Our funding comes from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses in South Dakota. If you like our classes thank a hunter or an angler.

How can we support The Outdoor Campus?

Buy a hunting and fishing license in South Dakota. Nationwide the sale of licenses are declining rapidly as we lose the Baby Boomer Generation. They were the last large group of hunters and anglers. We need to replace the funds they put toward habitat, wildlife management, conservation, recreation and education. Every single license you buy in your family helps fisheries, pheasant habitat and so much more—including The Outdoor Campus.

Do you get any other funds?

We do receive some funding from a Federal excise tax on hunting and fishing equipment sales. A small portion of each fishing pole or shotgun you buy can go toward hunting and fishing programs here.
