101 OPPORTUNITIES

101 opportunities have expanded to year round opportunities here at The Outdoor Campus. 101 opportunities consist of multi-session programs that end in field experiences. The best part is that they are free and have been paid for by hunters, anglers and target shooters.

If there isn't enough room in the program then we will have alternatives to accommodate everyone. All gear is provided. The only expense to you will be a hunting or fishing license. These programs are not designed for just youth. If you would like to sign your youth up for this program, we will require the parent or guardian to participate right along side. Adults and families with youth 12 yrs old or older are encouraged to apply.

Turkey 101: This application will only be open for a week after this newsletter gets out. If you miss it this year, please know that turkey 101 is an option for the following years. This 101 includes a Meet and Greet with classroom lessons, a turkey hunting seminar, a video call to get your license and learn to scout, a range day and 1-2 days in the field with a one of our mentors. **APPLY HERE**

Fishing 101/Ultimate Fishing Experience: This program will be all about time on the water. Apply to be apart of this cohort as we add people each season to try ice fishing, spearing, boat fishing and any type of fishing I can think of. Our goal is to learn about the different gear used for each species and techniques to target them. We will fish many different reservoirs and streams to learn a wide range of fishing styles.

Fly Fishing 101: With just a few classes we can get you comfortable and proficient with a fly rod. This program will spend lots of time practicing that cast and putting that practice to work on reservoirs and streams in the area.

101 OPPORTUNITIES CONTINUED

Hunting 101: Hunting 101 is our bread and butter 101 program. Participants usually spent an average of 21 hours in this program last year learning about wildlife management, gear, safe firearm handling, applying for tags, e-scouting, spend some time on the range and are guided on a deer hunt. This program is designed for folks wanting support in learning how to hunt. We understand the barriers of gun safety, knowing where to go and what the regulations are. Campus staff and volunteer mentors are here to help with that and guide you along the way. Our goal is to empower you with the knowledge and skills needed to become a hunter. **APPLY HERE**

Bowhunting 101: This program has very limited availability as bowhunting requires a lot of time and 1:1 attention. It is not required but hunting 101 is a preferred prerequisite to bowhunting 101. On night one we will be setting you up with a bow and fitting it to you. After that we will have multiple practices and honing our skills to work on shooting form to progress as a bowhunter. We then will spend some time in the field scouting and setting up stands and cameras before going on a deer hunt. **APPLY HERE**

ENTRY POINTS INTO THE OUTDOORS

We are gearing up for another summer of quality programs. There are lots of great things on the schedule from seminars, events with food trucks, shooting sports, rod building and lots of fishing. Over the course of the last 5 years, The Outdoor Campus west has taken a hard look at our programming to make it purposeful. We want to keep people engaged and come back for more. We call it our pathways. All sportsmen have a different entry point into the outdoors. An hour long class is our chance to snag a new fishermen or lifelong hunter so we aim to provide a quality experience but also attract participants in whatever way we can. That may be a kayaking class where participants are coming to paddle around the pond but when we ask those folks have they ever considered learning to hunt or shoot a bow, they jump right into that class. Most of our programs are going to be centered around hunting, fishing, trapping and shooting sports but every once in a while attracting the public with something other than that can bring us a new audience we may never have connected with. That allows them to start them down the pathway. We have seen it time and time again where a participant discovers the campus threw a simple hour long class and then they are taking everything we have to offer and buying every tag they can get. Some have even becoming friends and volunteers. If you are wanting to share the outdoors with someone, just remember that a pinnacle experience like an elk hunt or even a deer hunt may not be the best entry point for a new sportsmen. Take someone on a fishing trip for just a couple hours while the weather is nice, take them to one of our state parks to see the sights and fish while you're there or simply stop in to our office and walk around our habitats to observe the different wildlife we have in SD. Our education department is doing all it can to sustain our hunting and fishing heritage but the public is who will have the greatest impact. Many of us hunters may not want to see more hunters in our hunting spots but we do want to see support in all aspects for our activity and that comes from additional hunters and anglers

Attention all teachers! With summer right around the corner, we know you will be looking for opportunities for teacher development. The Game fish and parks provides many opportunities for this, you can either deepen current skills or gain new ones. Programs offered are shown below and contact for those providing these opportunities.

HuntSAFE - This workshop will train participants in how to run a HuntSAFE class at their school. HuntSAFE is the only firearms safety course recognized in the State of South Dakota to fulfill the requirement in law for young hunters (ages 12-15) to obtain a hunting license. NASP - This workshop will train participants to run their own NASP program at their school. NASP stands for National Archery in the Schools Program and is the largest youth archery program in history. If you are interested in this workshop, contact Brandon Maahs at Brandon.Maahs@state.sd.us

Teacher Professional Project Wild - This workshop will train participants to use Project Wild and Growing Up Wild curriculums. This class qualifies participants to receive resource guides and materials. These are nature-based programs that relate to South Dakota Content Standards requirements. The workshop includes classroom instruction, an opportunity to practice activities, and engage in outdoor field experience. South Dakota Game, Fish, and Parks will provide the resources for Project Wild and are funded through hunting and fishing license fees. DEER BRATS AKA DEER DOGS

Ingredients

- 17.5 lb ground deer meat
- 7.5 lb ground pork fat
- 32mm collagen casings
- Brat seasoning
- High temp cheese

If you are like my family, we grill year round and brats and hotdogs are a quick easy meal for a busy family. Store bought brats are great but I sure love making my own.

70% venison and 30% pork fat has been my favorite go to for a mixture so far but you can always tweak that. Grinding meat works best when it's semi frozen. Mix your favorite brat seasoning and the amount that the directions suggest for the amount of meat you have. I suggest the blue ribbon seasoning from Waltons. Grind both meats with a course grind, hand mix then grind through the medium plate. Then add the cheese until it appears it would make some cheese into each brat. Do not over mix. Avoid the meat getting sticky (protein extraction) For deer sticks and summer sausage this is important but not brats.

Load the meat into a sausage stuffer. The dual gear stuffers are worth any extra cost they may have. However a 5-7 lb. stuffer is sufficient. Make sure to avoid air bubbles but slowly turn the crank to fill the casings. This takes practice but keep them between splitting the casing and not full. It will still taste great no matter what.

I keep these raw and throw them right on the top rack of the grill as it's warming up. Rotate often and remove once they start spitting grease and cheese.



WOMEN IN HUNTING

Historically, women have long been considered gatherers, while males were considered hunters. Women are changing that perception in record numbers. Female hunters are one of the fastest-growing demographics in hunting. Providing food for their families, enjoying solitary time outside to connect with nature and learning about animals and their behaviors are just some of the reasons women are becoming hunters. The hunting industry has taken notice to this trend by providing hunting gear that is fitted especially for women making it easier for women to participate. There has even been a change in laws that allow fluorescent pink in addition to the traditional fluorescent orange as a legal exterior garment color (check regulations for examples of exterior garments and requirements).

More opportunities for women to learn hunting and fishing are also becoming more prominent. The Outdoor Campus continues to provide hunting education for everyone! In the past few years, we have seen more and more women participating in our hunting programs. Last year 13 out of the 28 participants were women in our Hunting 101 program. 100% of the women were successful in harvesting a deer and taking home some meat for their families. As we continue to provide hunting and fishing education, think about bringing the entire family! Hunting and fishing are great activities for the entire family. Women...if you are new to the sport and want to learn how to hunt or fish and don't see anything that works for you on our program schedule, get some of your friends together and let us plan a women's only program for you!
