
NEW STAFF!

NEW REGISTRATION SYSTEM

We have now transitioned to our registration system over to Go Outdoors South Dakota. What this means for you is you will be able to do everything Game, Fish and Parks has to offer from one place. You will be able to purchase your hunting or fishing license, reserve a camp site, and register for an educational program and at one place at one time! For those of you who already have an account, you do not need to do anything, unless you will need to link kids or others to your account (see step 3). Need to set up an account? Check out the steps below to prepare you for the switch.

- 1.) You can follow the directions in this short video on how to set up an account: Watch this for <u>Click Here to watch</u> or log on to <u>https://gooutdoorssouthdakota.com/</u> and click through the steps to set up your account.
- 2.) Once you have created an account you should be able to log on to Go Outdoors.
- ***Parents or caregivers there is an additional step needed to register for program for your kids. Each kid will need an account. You will follow the same process you do for yourself to set up an account but do so for each of your kids. This will allow you to link their account to yours.
- 3.) To link kids or others to your account:

Log into your Go Outdoors South Dakota account and click the linked account green tab. (see photo above.)


Next click add linked account



Link Customer: search for accounts you wish to add. Keep doing this until you have added all people you wish to be able to register or make purchases (licenses) on their behalf.

You will only have to do these steps once. From this point on if you wish to register for a class, you will log in to your account on Go Outdoors South Dakota and register for programs for yourself and/or anyone you linked to your account.

MOUNTAIN LION HUNTING

The Black Hills is home to a healthy population of mountain lions and to manage them effectively GFP has been able to use hunting as a tool to to do that. Hunting lions in the hills is no easy task. In fact is down right challenging both physically and mentally. Early mornings in dangerous temperatures and miles upon miles trudging through the snow is what many hunters experience trying to catch up to the most elusive critters we have around. Here's a few simple steps to utilize this lion season to see if you can't get some of that tasty pork like meat this winter.

- 1. Time out the weather. If there's a spot in the hills that got a dusting of snow to just a couple inches, get out early that morning. You can't hunt that lion until legal shooting hours but it helps to go drive the miles looking. The Black Hills is very roaded so after cutting a track, do your best to box that cat in to one specific area. No need to hike 3 miles if it ended up crossing the another road later on.
- 2. As long as the track is a single cat track, get on it and start following to see what it's doing. If it's a traveling cat, you may not catch up but if it's a hunting cat, that's the one you want.
- 3. Once your on the track, if it is looking really fresh, then sit down in some cover. They may not want to run out into an opening. Put your predator call out a little ways and start playing some sounds. Sit back and don't move. Cats are visual hunters and may sit and watch an area before coming in.
- 4. Use some unique sounds. The usual jackrabbit in distress may not be the most effective.
- Keep your eyes pealed and hopefully you are dressed for a cold sit.
- 6. If you find yourself a lion kill, those can be another good place to sit to see if that cat will come back to stuff his belly again.



NEW FISH SPECIES TO TARGET THIS WINTER

As we hit the month of December many of our western South Dakota lakes have started to ice over and some are starting to provide winter recreation opportunities for ice anglers. Ice fishing can be a great time to target trout, panfish, Walleye, and Northern Pike. Those are all great options, but we also want to educate folks about some of the unique species we have in the Black Hills region for those looking to try something new this year. First, let's talk about some of the unique ice fishing opportunities on our larger Black Hills reservoirs. One species that can only be found in these reservoirs is Lake Trout. Lake Trout often exceed 30 inches total length in Pactola and Deerfield reservoirs and a stronger rod is suggested, as well as a larger reel with more line capacity, as these fish often inhabit deeper water, sometimes over 100 feet down. Tactics for Lake Trout include jigging large spoons or using large baitfish, both live and frozen. Also, a newer addition to Pactola is Kokanee Salmon which were reintroduced to the lake in 2022. Kokanee also prefer deeper waters and are often caught in 30-60 ft of water. Anglers targeting Kokanee often use spoons or small dodgers as an attractor, with a small jig rigged up 8-12 inches below the attractor. Combining this rig with other scent and bait combinations is also common. For those looking for some other unique species in the Black Hills consider trying out Center Lake or Sylvan Lake in Custer State Park. These lakes are two of a select few locations in the Black Hills where you can target Yellowstone Cutthroat Trout and Tiger Trout, a hybrid Brown x Brook Trout. Regardless of whether you are chasing Walleyes, Bluegill, or Trout this winter, make sure to be safe on the ice. Always fish with a friend, and if you are unsure of the ice thickness be sure to take a spud bar and drill holes early and often to assess ice conditions!





WINTER TRAPLINE

Trapping is the next activity to help break those winter blues. I believe trapping is one of the outdoor activities that takes some of the most determination, time and grit. However there are some great kid opportunities as well that don't require as much work. Some may think that if you set a trap out in the woods that it is guaranteed to trap the next critter that gets anywhere close to it but in fact, you are trying to convince a pretty smart animal to step just right on the smallest of spots. If you left a little scent behind then they will outsmart that. Trapping requires an ability to read animal sign and be able to predict those animal movements.

Trapping has a variety of different skill levels required so to help determine your quarry here's some things to consider. Coyotes are among the smartest and the toughest to catch. Bobcats can be tricky not because there isn't plenty of them but that they cover a larger area so the densities of them isn't comparable to others like a racoon where there might be dozens in one small stretch of river bottom. Raccoons, skunks and muskrats are some great additions to the trapline because they can be plentiful depending on the area and it's nice to have something caught instead of week after week of empty traps. Beaver are another great opportunity without too much difficulty but important to be able to read animal sign to see if they are around.

January 9th we are hosting an intro to trapping class that is a great opportunity to pick up a few skills to get started. Make sure to check out that class coming up very soon.



COYOTE HUNTING SEMINAR

Coming up on Jan 6th we will have a seminar all about coyote hunting. Western South Dakota has some of the best looking coyote pelts in the country and when you get those handled properly and tanned they can make some amazing garments or wall hangers.

Collin will go over some setup tactics, calling techniques and locations that he uses to place yourself in the right spot to be a successful coyote caller.

Next we will go over the use of the ever popular thermal. Thermals are gaining popularity and increasing folks ability to be successful calling coyotes under the cover of night. It still isn't as easy as it sounds so we will go over some more night hunting tactics, regulations and safety factors to keep in mind when hunting coyotes using thermal imaging. BEST WAY TO USE GROUND VENISON

If you had a successful freezer filling fall like I had, you may have more meat then you know what to do with. I can only eat so many burgers per week and casseroles with wild game but to give you even more options this new year, this is what I do;

Brats - I do a 50:50 mix of pork to venison, some seasoning and high temp cheese to make feeding a couple kids as well as myself very easy for quick evening meals and summer grill outs. Brats are always on our menu at home and can't get enough of them.

Deer Bacon - It's not what it sounds like. Its actually made from ground venison. A mix of 40% pork to 60% venison, some seasoning and cure in a tinfoil pan. Then putting on the smoker for a few hours and sliced thin. Its a great addition to breakfast or a hot bacon and cheese sandwich for lunch.

Summer sausage and deer sticks. While working in the office, we often get our 10:00 and 2:00 cravings. These mixing up some summer sausage or sticks to the mix is another way to mix up those mid day cravings. With a sausage stuffer and vertical smoker you can make just about anything.
