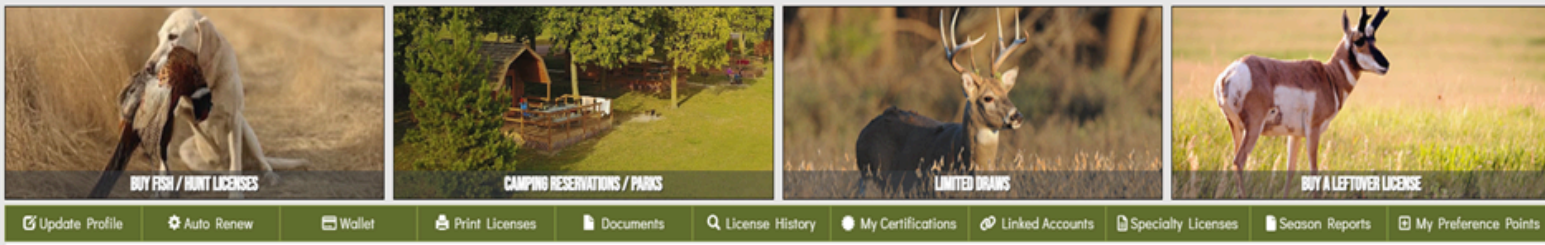
PHEASANT HUNTING

NEW REGISTRATION SYSTEM

You will notice in this newsletter our education programs looking a little light, there's an exciting reason for this! Starting November 1st, we are transitioning our registration system over to Go Outdoors South Dakota. What this means for you is November 15th you will be able to do everything Game, Fish and Parks has to offer from one place. You will be able to purchase your hunting or fishing license, reserve a camp site, and register for an educational program and at one place at one time! For those of you who already have an account, you do not need to do anything, unless you will need to link kids or others to your account (see step 3). Need to set up an account? Check out the steps below to prepare you for the switch.

1.) You can follow the directions in this short video on how to set up an account: Watch this for [Click Here to watch](#) or log on to <https://gooutdoorsouthdakota.com/> and click through the steps to set up your account.

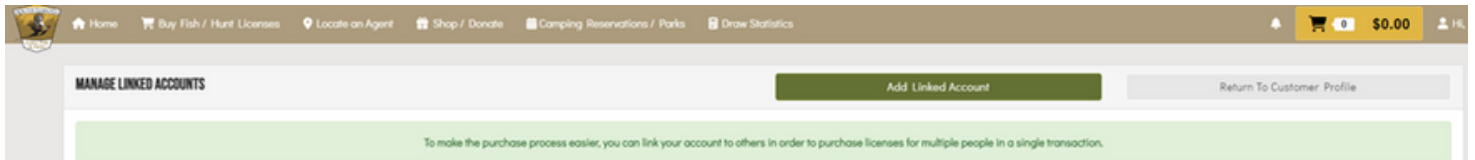
2.) Once you have created an account you should be able to log on to Go Outdoors.

***Parents or caregivers there is an additional step needed to register for program for your kids. Each kid will need an account. You will follow the same process you do for yourself to set up an account but do so for each of your kids. This will allow you to link their account to yours.

3.) To link kids or others to your account:

Log into your Go Outdoors South Dakota account and click the linked account green tab. (see photo above.)

Next click add linked account



Link Customer: search for accounts you wish to add. Keep doing this until you have added all people you wish to be able to register or make purchases (licenses) on their behalf.

You will only have to do these steps once. From this point on if you wish to register for a class, you will log in to your account on Go Outdoors South Dakota and register for programs for yourself and/or anyone you linked to your account.

We do urge you to start this process now. Starting November 15th you will need to go to <https://gooutdoorsouthdakota.com/> and search for education programs. You can use this time to get your accounts set up and linked together so you will be ready November 1st to register for all those amazing class options. 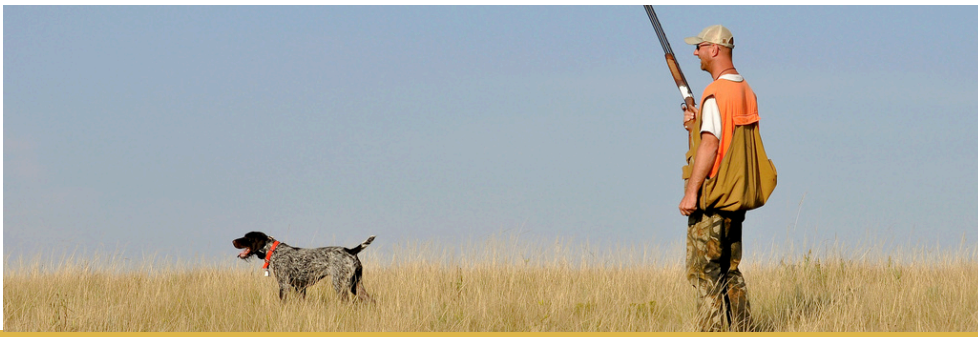
SOUTH DAKOTA PRONGHORN POPULATION UPDATE

Each September, SDGFP staff across the state conduct pronghorn herd composition surveys. These surveys provide sex and age ratios. Biennially from May to mid-June, aerial surveys are flown to collect spring adult population estimates. Based on 2024 aerial surveys and 2023 herd composition surveys, the 2024 pronghorn preseason population is estimated at 34,737 (95% CI = 20,929 – 48,613), well below the objective (59,000 – 80,000). The low population is due to low adult survival documented in 2020 and 2023, as well as low fawn recruitment in 2021 and 2022. The ultimate cause of this decline is unknown but may be due to late winter storms, drought, or disease. Adult survival and fawn recruitment drive population growth and can vary substantially from year to year, highlighting the necessity for annual surveys. Population declines similar to this have been documented in the past and have recovered to levels within the objective. To help improve herd growth, “any antelope” licenses were changed to “buck only” for the 2022 and 2023 firearm seasons (except Landowner Antelope). In 2024, all licenses were changed to “buck only” to help further mitigate the population decline.

FALL CAMPING

It may not seem like it with our current warm temperatures, but fall is right around the corner. You may think that camping season ends when the temperatures start dropping, but really it just opens a new, fun camping season. With a few extra preparations your fall camping can be just as enjoyable as warm weather camping.

It is highly recommended that you check the weather at your specific camping destination. The weather can change quickly so be prepared for the chance of snow, rain, or severe weather.

Pack layers. Being able to strip or add layers will prepare you for temperature changes. Thermal underwear, sleeping cap, gloves, socks, and a winter jacket are some good options for layers. If you are planning to tent camp or sleep on the ground, make sure and bring a mattress pad or foam to provide an extra layer between your cold weather sleeping bag and the ground. If camping in a tent or a camper doesn't sound like your cup of tea, many of our state parks have camping cabins and modern lodging. Check out the Camping in South Dakota,

PHEASANT HUNTING

September to January! Those are the months I look forward to every year. South Dakota really shines with hunter opportunity and diversity during these months, and you can chase roosters that whole time. September 28th is the start of our youth season. We then get the benefits from our conservation efforts and can hunt pheasants until the end of January.

Pheasant hunting changes over the course of the seasons. Warm days, warm dogs, families, and our South Dakota residents are the focus as we kick off the pheasant season. This year, October 19th is that exciting day when modern day conservation efforts bring people together from all over the world and reinforce just how valuable our time, families, habitats, and wildlife are.

As crops are harvested and the snow starts, again pheasant season changes. During the late season, the birds get smart, maybe even a little “cocky” as they maneuver out of range of our best tactical game plans. As much as I enjoy holding and admiring the brilliancy of a long tailed late season rooster after a lucky shot, I can't help but respect and take joy in knowing some of the birds get away. I know my head is in the right place when I can appreciate their Houdini act while murmuring..... well played sir, well played!

To compete with those late season birds, pheasant season again changes for me. Often, I like bowhunting for roosters. What I mean by that is I leave the dog and hunting buddies behind, and I get stealthy. I feel that the rooster's ears and his quick feet are their greatest assists. My tactic; walking fast and as quite as I possibly can with the intent to surprise. I'm targeting the edges of cover while walking deer trails or the quietist of routes. As I move, I'm listening. I'm listening for them rustling in the cover after being surprised by my presence and I rush that sound forcing them to flush rather than keep running.

Pheasant hunting has a taster's choice of techniques, so cheers to the pheasant and their habitat.



MISSISSIPPI POT ROAST

Ingredients:

- 3 lbs venison roast
- 1 tbsp of Lawry's seasoning salt
- Dijon Mustard (enough to coat roast)
- ½ tsp black pepper
- 1 1/2 tsp of chives
- 2 tsp of parsley
- 1 tsp of oregano
- 2 tsp of fresh dill
- 3 diced garlic cloves
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 6 tbsp butter
- 1 cup diced yellow onion
- 3 tbsp flour
- 7 pepperoncini's
- 4 tbsp juice from pepperoncini's
- Hamburger Buns or Yellow Potatoes (your choice)

1.) Ensure venison roast is thawed, remove roast from fridge and allow to temper for a half-hour to an hour. Preheat slow cooker to a low heat.

2.) Once venison roast is tempered, Coat roast with mustard and season with Lawry's seasoning salt and black pepper.

3.) Bring a skillet to a medium-high heat, add oil to skillet, and sear roast on each side within the skillet.

4.) Add roast to slow cooker, reduce pan to a simmer.

5.) Melt butter in the pan and add diced onions and diced garlic, sautéing ingredients until translucent. Stir in flour and mix until all ingredients are incorporated. Add ingredients into slow cooker.

6.) Add in pepperoncini's, pepperoncini juice, chives, parsley, dill, and oregano.

7.) Cover cooker and allow meat to cook for six to eight hours. (Until meat can easily be shredded)

8.) Place your roast and liquids into a large bowl and shred the roast. Add shredded venison to buns or with mashed potatoes.



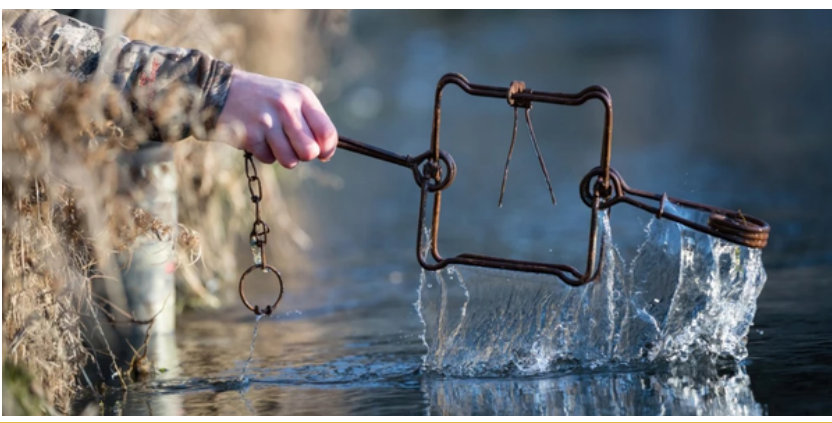
COMMENTS FROM A NEW HUNTER

TRAPPING

So you want to trap? Before you start here are a few tips. Many of us consider ourselves good sportsman and believe we have a good grasp on the workings of the animal kingdom beyond the normal person and to an extent that is true.

Here are some facts. Trapping is hard work but lots of fun and rewarding time outdoors. There is an enormous amount of prep work both in readying traps and equipment as well as pre-season scouting. Once you make a catch there is more work in properly skinning and preparing your pelts for market or tanning for your own trophy.

Unlike hunting and fishing, trapping is not always an exact area of picking your catch. A hunter will have the chance to identify and take a shot or pass on a deer. A fisherman will be able to tailor his catch by choosing baits or lures and the manner in which they use it. A trapper who makes a dirt hole set could just as easily catch a skunk as a coyote however.

The one thing that sets trappers apart from others is the pre-season, in-season and after-season scouting. No matter what season it is if you have time you will find yourself stopping to “check what is out there”. Trappers are outdoors in all seasons and all conditions. Trapping makes you a more in tuned all round outdoorsman. So go have some fun and joy the outdoors like you never have before!



RABBIT AND SQUIRREL HUNTING

Small game hunting can be a fun alternative when you may be getting burnt out from sitting in a blind or didn't get a big game tag. For the western region of South Dakota, some common small game animals to hunt would include Cottontail Rabbits, and Tree Squirrels. The Black Hills provide excellent habitat for these species to thrive. When hunting for small game a .22 rifle or a shotgun with 5-7 shot will work perfectly. Scouting or knowing areas where there is an abundant amount of food, and dense brush can help increase your chances of seeing something. Looking for tracks or signs like droppings, chew marks, and small burrows will also help with locating some animals. When moving through your area it is a good idea to move slowly and as quiet as possible, these animals have exceptional hearing. Rabbits and squirrels are most active during dawn and dusk, so these would be the ideal times to try and hunt them. Just like with most other hunting you will want to wear some kind of camo; this will help you be able to get closer and make better shots. Lastly, there are some calls available for squirrel hunting that could help call squirrels in closer to you.
