### RETURN POLICY (NEW FOR 2026)

**Deadline:** April 01, 2026

**Fee:** \$10 - Residents | \$30 - Nonresidents

A fee will be assessed if a customer returns their license and they are not eligible for subsequent draws for that respective season.

April 11, 2026 to May 31, 2026\*

### DRAW GUIDELINES

**First:** Applicant may submit only one application per person.

**Second:** Those who do not already have a license may submit only one application per person.

**Third:** After the second drawing, remaining licenses are pooled and available to both residents and nonresidents. Residents and nonresidents may apply for one additional license even if they already possess a license from the first or second drawings.

**Leftover:** An individual may have an unlimited number of licenses for this season in any unit or any combination of units. Licenses will be issued first-come, first-served by online application only.

Residents are eligible to apply for all units. Nonresidents are eligible to apply for all units west of the Missouri River, and licenses east of the Missouri River remaining after the second drawing.

### LEGAL FIREARMS/MUZZLELOADERS

A person may not use a rimfire, centerfire, or muzzleloading rifle during any spring turkey season. No self-loading or auto-loading firearm that holds more than six cartridges may be used to hunt, pursue, shoot at, shoot, kill, or wound a wild turkey. No firearm that is capable of being operated as a full automatic may be used to hunt, pursue, shoot at, shoot, kill, or wound a wild turkey. No buckshot may be used, and no single ball or rifled slug weighing less than one-half ounce may be used in hunting wild turkey. Shotguns using ammunition which is factory-rated to produce at least 700 footpounds of energy at the muzzle and handguns using ammunition which is factory-rated to produce at least 500 foot-pounds of energy at the muzzle may be used for hunting wild turkey. Muzzleloading handguns that discharge a projectile of at least .50 caliber and muzzleloading shotguns may also be used for hunting wild turkey. Any person who holds a license to take a wild turkey during the firearm season may take the wild turkey by using a crossbow in lieu of a firearm. Crossbow means a device for propelling a bolt by means of traverse limbs mounted on a stock and a string. The crossbow may be drawn, held, and released by a mechanical device and shall have at least 125 pounds pull and have a working mechanical safety.





# Know Your Wild Turkey

Considered among the **grandest of game birds**, the American wild turkey has many characteristics that distinguish it from other fowl. The unmistakable snood, caruncles, head coloring and beard truly set it apart.




## Know the Difference Between Hens and Gobblers

It's easy to distinguish a gobbler from a hen by differences in their **size, color, heads and other characteristics**.


### Gobbler

The gobbler is most easily recognized by the long beard growing from his chest and the pronounced spurs, sometimes as long as 2 inches, found on the back of his legs. A gobbler appears larger, darker, shinier and more colorful than a hen. His head can alternately appear red, white and blue. He often "puffs up" and struts during spring to attract hens for breeding.



### Hen

The hen's overall look is for concealment and protection. She is smaller and more drab than the colorful gobbler, so she can sit on her nest well camouflaged. Likewise, her head has more feathers to add to her camouflaged appearance.
