Minutes of the Game, Fish, and Parks Commission January 12-13, 2017

Chairman Peterson called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. CT at the RedRossa Convention Center in Pierre, South Dakota. Commissioners Barry Jensen, H. Paul Dennert, Gary Jensen, W. Scott Phillips and Doug Sharp were present. Secretary Kelly Hepler was present along with approximately 30 public, staff, and media.

DIVISION OF ADMINISTRATION Conflict of Interest Disclosure

Chairperson Peterson called for conflicts of interest to be disclosed. None were presented.

Approval of Minutes

Chairperson Peterson called for any additions or corrections to the December 15, 2016, minutes or a motion for approval.

Motion by G. Jensen with second by B. Jensen TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE DECEMBER 15, 2016, MEETING WITH MINOR REVISIONS. Motion carried unanimously.

Additional Commissioner Salary Days

Commissioner G. Jensen requested one additional salary day for attendance at the Spearfish Canyon planning meeting and Peterson requested three additional salary days for attendance at WAFWA.

Motion by Dennert with second by Phillips TO APPROVE THE ADDITIONAL SALARY DAYS AS REQUESTED. Motion carried unanimously.

Election of Officers

Motion by G. Jensen with second by Dennert TO NOMINATE PETERSON AS CHAIR. Motion carried unanimously.

Motion by G. Jensen with second by Dennert TO NOMINATE B. JENSEN AS VICE CHAIR. Motion carried unanimously.

License List Requests

Chris Petersen, Administration Division Director presented a license list request from the Rapid City Journal for all elk licenses for the 2016 season statewide and in Custer State Park to be used for a news article about the distribution of elk licenses for the 2016 hunting season.

Petersen explained the fee structure for license list requests indicating the cost is \$100 for each 1,000 names for commercial and for profit businesses. The fee is waived for government entities and nonprofit organization can acquire the list for \$100 regardless of size. Petersen noted that all license holders have the option to opt out from the release of their information.

Petersen explained the request for elk license list from the Rapid City Journal would typically be assessed the standard fee of \$100 per 1,000 names as they are a for-profit business. He further noted that the Rapid City Journal asked that the fee be waived, which can be requested by any entity, but in the past all media organizations have been required to pay the fee.

He also informed the Commission that the standard form completed by the Rapid City Journal indicates they plan to use the list for news articles which may concern the potential release of license holder names. In the past GFP has released number of licenses sold, where they were sold and where license holders resided by county and city free of charge.

In response to Commissioner Peterson's question Petersen explained that license lists containing name and address only have been purchased by media outlets to be utilized for mailings and license lists containing demographic info without names has also been released.

The Commission agreed that if a list if provided the will need to pay the full fee as a for profit business and requested Petersen follow up with the Rapid City Journal to collect additional information on how the information will be utilized.

The Commission agreed to defer the matter until the next meeting due to concerns for releasing license holder personally identifiable information.

Department Sponsored Legislation for 2017

Secretary Hepler stated that no Department sponsored legislation has been turned in, but there will be a special appropriation for 2.5 million dollars to facilitate the land exchange between the Black Hills Forest and School and Public Lands Trust Fund for Spearfish Canyon

Strategic Plan Update

Emily Kiel, communications director, provided the Commission an update on the GFP strategic plan. She indicated the four goals and 22 objectives will be utilized by staff as measuring tools to evaluate department programs and processes.

Chris Hull, communications outreach specialist, explained the significance of the department vision and mission statement noting the vision is who the department strives to be and the mission is what the agency does daily.

Nancy Surprenant, parks and recreation division staff specialist, noted the values are what the Department believes and why we do what we do. Surprenant detailed each of the four goals explaining that these goals guide the department in getting to where it wants to be. Surprenant and Kiel then highlighted the priorities under each goal area.

PROPOSALS
Duck Hunting Season

Chad Switzer, Wildlife Program Manager and Rocco Murano, Senior Wildlife Biologist presented the recommended change to decrease the pintail daily limit from 2 to 1.

Motioned by B. Jensen with second by Dennert TO APPROVE THE PROPOSAL AS RECOMMENDED. Motion carried unanimously.

Goose Hunting Season

Switzer and Murano presented the recommended change from last year to increase the number of days for the light goose hunting season from 86 days to 105 days as allowed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Motioned by Phillips with second by Sharp TO APPROVE THE PROPOSAL AS RECOMMENDED. Motion carried unanimously.

Tundra Swan Hunting Season

Switzer and Murano presented the recommended changes from last year to Increase the total number of available licenses from 1,300 to 1,675 and of the adjusted total number of available licenses, increasing the number of nonresident licenses from 200 to 250.

Motioned by Sharp with second by Phillips TO APPROVE THE PROPOSAL AS RECOMMENDED. Motion carried unanimously.

Public Water Zoning

Emmett Keyser, Wildlife Regional Manager and Bob Schneider, Parks Assistant Division Director presented the recommended changes from last year to add a 'public swimming zone' on Lake Madison in Lake County, amend the size and configuration of the 'public swimming zone' on Lake Alvin in Lincoln County, amend and clarify the language contained in the 'public water safety zone' regulation for Sheridan Lake in Pennington County, and to add a 'no motors zone' on Lewis and Clark Lake in Yankton County.

Motioned by Dennert with second by Phillips TO APPROVE THE PROPOSAL AS RECOMMENDED. Motion carried unanimously.

Motorboats and Watercraft

Brandon Gust, Law Enforcement Training Supervisor, presented the recommended changes from last year to amend current administrative rule 41:04:05:14 for careless operation of a boat to appropriately address those instances of careless operation and define what careless operation of a boat is and to create a new administrative rule to address instances of eluding law enforcement by boat.

Motioned by B. Jensen with second by Sharp TO APPROVE THE PROPOSAL AS RECOMMENDED. Motion carried unanimously.

Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS)

John Lott, Aquatic Resources Chief and Mike Smith, Wildlife Biologist presented the recommendation to create four new rules and modify two rules related to aquatic invasive species.

- Create a new rule that defines and identifies specific waters that will be classified as "Containment Waters".
- 2. Create a new rule that allows for the creation of local boater registries.
- 3. Create a new rule that requires the decontamination of boats with a compartment containing more than one gallon of water after use in a "Containment Water".
- 4. Create a new rule that requires the decontamination of boats that have been moored in a "Containment Water" for three or more continuous days.
- 5. Amend administrative rule to allow businesses approved by the department to transport and possess boats with aquatic invasive species attached for the purpose of decontamination.
- 6. Amend administrative rule to allow participants in a local boater registry to transport and possess aquatic invasive species in accordance with the provisions of the registry.
- 7. Amend administrative rule to allow participants in a local boater registry to launch a boat with an aquatic invasive species attached if it is done in accordance with the provisions of the registry.

Motioned by G. Jensen with second by Phillips TO APPROVE THE PROPOSAL AS RECOMMENDED. Motion carried unanimously.

Secretary Hepler further expressed the importance for concern with AIS.

Tony Leif, Wildlife Division Director provided an overview for a balanced approach between education and regulation with focus on existing rules to slow the spread of AIS as it is not possible to stop. Leif explained the need to take responsible steps to eliminate the transport of water or AIS from contaminated waters to another body of water. He noted a major concern is watercraft equipped with ballast tanks that cannot be fully drained as presenting the greatest risk of movement of AIS to other waters.

Commissioner G. Jensen proposes by way of resolution to have the Department develop a gold standard comprehensive AIS management plan combining education and regulation to include necessary authorities in rule and statute, partnership with other entities, staff, equipment and monetary resources.

Motioned by G. Jensen with second by Phillips TO CREATE A COMPREHENSEIVE AIS MANAGEMENT PLAN BY WAY OF RESOLUTION. Motion carried unanimously.

OPEN FORUM

Chairwoman Peterson opened the floor for discussion from those in attendance on matters of importance to them that may not be on the agenda

George Vandel, Vice President SD Waterfowl Association informed the Commission that nonresident waterfowl licenses continue to be a relevant issue for his organization. He noted the season was unusual this year with a decrease in birds. Vandel stated the Association wants to be respectful of the Commission and indicated

South Dakota is a wonderful place with opportunities, resources and access largely in part to the management system that is in place, and they plan to bring a recommendation in March. At this time they are unsure what format the recommendation will be in.

Commissioner Sharp asked Vandel what they think caused the decrease.

Vandel responded that dry weather causes the lack in of production of ducks and habitat. He said conditions were better in Canada causing the birds to stay north. Vandel noted we need more fall moisture. He also stated this may also cause a decrease in waterfowl licenses.

DIVISION OF PARKS AND RECREATION

Custer State Park Buffalo Auction Results

Regional Supervisor Matt Snyder introduced Mark Henricks, new Resource Program Manager promoted from within the Parks Division.

Snyder provided an update on the video auction was offered this year to allow for the sale to be held indoors at the new visitor's center theater. He explained how this process met the objective with less stress on the animal. Snyder indicated there were 21 online bidders from 7 states and 35 bidders from 14 states in the visitor's center, with 15 buyers from 11 states total. He stated the majority went to private producers who are growing their herds and meat markets. They sold a total of 255 buffalo for \$671,900.00. Snyder explained they will winter over 950 animals with more available for auction next year.

Spearfish Canyon Proposed State Park Update

Katie Ceroll, Parks and Recreation Division Director, presented a powerpoint presentation to the Commission detailing the proposed Spearfish Canyon State Park. Ceroll explained how the park fits with the Department's mission and vision to provide outdoor recreational opportunities through responsible management by fostering partnerships and cultivating stewardship to connect people with the outdoors for current and future generations. Ceroll informed the Commission that state park designation is given to areas of outstanding natural beauty that contain significant historical, botanical, archeological, ecological or geological values. She further explained that any enhancements would harmonize with the natural environment with criteria in place to protect these areas.

Snyder explained that enhancing and preserving is what GFP does. Snyder detailed how the incorporation of Bismarck Lake into Custer State Park would not only eliminate confusion but make state park facilities available for Bismarck Lake visitors' use. He said there are currently 23 primitive campsites there on a different reservation system that could be handled by current GFP FTE for seamless management and projects from fisheries to day use activities. Snyder indicate that users of these sites are currently utilizing services provided by Custer State Park, but uses of Custer State Park are required to pay an additional fee to visit Bismarck Lake. Snyder also informed the

Commission that GFP is actively managing trail systems with commitments to replace sections each year and would also be able to handle the waste water handling issues at Camp Bob Marshall. These are all things the Forest Service does not have the funds to fix.

Ceroll explained the process of creating the vision through public input that will be led by consultant Peaks to Plains. She detailed the process over the next eight months beginning with meetings in January with the final plan to be delivered in September.

Parks Revenue, Camping and Visitation Reports

Parks and Recreation Assistant Director Bob Schneider provided the year to date comparison of state park system revenue, camping and visitation. He noted overall revenue was up 8 percent and with a 5 percent increase in camping units served over 2016 and visitation was up by 2 percent.

DIVISION OF WILDLIFE

Season Setting and Management Plan Reporting Schedules for 2017

Tom Kirschenmann, Wildlife Assistant Division Director provided overview of the 2017 season, regulation and management plan update schedule. Kirschenmann noted that many of the seasons are now on a multiyear schedule with the bulk of proposals being presented in May and June. He also stated that they will provide management plan updates as things progress.

Bighorn Sheep Population Update

Chad Lehman, senior wildlife biologist, presented a powerpoint on bighorn sheep research and management. Lehman provided an over on population surveys, licenses and transplant history. He also provided detailed research data collected from Hell Canyon, Custer State Park/Rapid City and Deadwood herds. Lehman detailed diseases tested, survival rates and forage results.

WIA Survey Results

Cindy Longmire, wildlife division staff specialist presented a powerpoint on the Walk in Area (WIA) survey results for 2015. Longmire informed the Commission of the top issue reported by 46 percent of hunters to be not enough access to places to hunt. Longmire provided detailed statistics for hunting of upland game, big game and waterfowl in WIA as well as the overall evaluation of WIA's.

Statewide Fisheries Plan Update

Geno Adams, wildlife program administrator, provided an update on the statewide fisheries plan noting the priorities and programs for the fish management areas across the state. Adams also provided information on fish surveys, research, habitat management and non-game aquatic management.

Will Sayler, wildlife program administrator, updated the Commission on fishing access, fish production and stocking, bait an private aquaculture, aquatic invasive

specials and fish health and contaminants. Sayler also noted the timeline for plan updates for each management area.

Missouri River Fisheries Update

Jason Sorensen, fisheries biologist, provided the Commission an update on the Missouri River Fisheries by area. Sorensen provided detailed information on prey fish status, walleye population, creel survey data and sport fish for Lakes Oahe, Sharpe, Lake Francis Case and Lewis and Clark. He also updated the Commission in regards to on-going research projects: walleye tagging, rainbow smelt spawning locations, salmon tagging, gizzard shad telemetry, rainbow trout telemetry and shovelnose sturgeon telemetry.

History of Fishing Regulations

Sorensen provided the Commission information on the history of fishing regulations. He explained how these regulations are utilized as a management tool. Sorensen noted how fisheries vary from one body of water to another and that length restrictions only work in very specific scenarios.

Shoreline Improvement Projects

Rhet Russell, wildlife biologist, presented a powerpoint on the shoreline restoration program noting the importance of natural functioning shorelines. Russell presented examples of ideal habitat and what causes loss in shoreline habitat. He detailed the shoreline restoration process, benefits and specific projects.

Authorizations for Terminally III Hunters Issued in 2016

Wildlife Division Director, Tony Leif informed the Commission on the number of authorizations issued to terminally ill hunters in 2016. Leif stated that 5 individuals received authorizations to hunt, one received an antelope tag for Pennington County, one received an east river dear tag for Beadle County, one received a Custer State Park turkey tag and another individual received a fall turkey tag for Perkins County and statewide muzzleloader license. In addition access permits were provided to two son's to allow then to hunt alongside the terminally ill hunter.

Special Permits for Hunters/Anglers with Disabilities

Leif provided follow up information on the request received in November to allow special permits for hunters and anglers with disabilities. Leif indicated staff continues to look into options regarding authorities to provide these types of allowances. At this point staff have worked to provide individuals with disabilities the same opportunities as other hunters and anglers. Per discussion with the Commission Leif will bring additional information for the Commission to review for the possibility to expand the authority to allow individuals with disabilities additional opportunities to accommodate for a specific medical reason.

Year-end 2016 License Sales

Scott Simpson, wildlife administration chief, presented the 2016 licenses projections sales and revenue. Simpson explained how license sales projections are made by aquatic and terrestrial biologists and managers in July and August for the next

year. The presentation provided breakdown of licenses sales for 2016 and 5 years of licenses sales history for resident and nonresidents by license types.

License Returns due to EHD

Kirschenmann provided the Commission statistics on Epizootic Hemorrhagic Disease (EHD) reports and license returns in 2016. Statistics presented indicated the number licenses returned by type for residents totaling 1,629 and nonresidents as well as the number of 3rd draw licenses pulled by unit totaling 1,251 statewide resulting in a fiscal impact of \$143,087.00.

Kirschenmann also provide a map of the deer mortality reports and EHD confirmations statewide. Numbers indicated 2,214 dead deer reported as of November 30, 2016 with 27 EHD positive results in 21 counties.

DOW Distinguished Achievement Award

Leif presented Rhet Russell with the Division of Wildlife Distinguished Achievement Award. Russell who began with GFP in parks and recreation then transferred to the wildlife division works to meet the needs of anglers as an aquatic habitat biologist. Leif commended Russell's ability to work with interested parties and complete important projects.

Motioned by B. Jensen with second by Sharp TO ADJOURN THE MEETING. Motion carried unanimously and the meeting adjourned at 12:00 p.m.

Minutes of the Game, Fish, and Parks Commission Special Meeting January 25, 2017

Chairman Peterson called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. CT via teleconference. Commissioners Mary Boyd, Barry Jensen, H. Paul Dennert, Gary Jensen, Russell Olson, and W. Scott Phillips were present when the roll was called. It was noted that a quorum was present. Secretary Kelly Hepler was present along with 6 staff in Pierre, 2 staff in Sioux Falls and no attendees at the Rapid City location.

License List Request - Rapid City Journal

Secretary Hepler provided an overview of the license list request from the Rapid City Journal for all elk licenses for the 2016 season statewide and in Custer State Park to be used for a news article about the distribution of elk licenses for the 2016 hunting season and the option of waiving the fee. Hepler indicated that he and Chris Petersen followed up with the Rapid City Journal per the Commission's request. He indicated that they are willing to pay the fee and want to use the information to produce news stories and do not plan publish the names. Hepler indicated the concern remains that there is no guarantee that they will not publish the names. It was again stated that applicant's user profile provides the option to opt out of these lists and the \$100 fee is utilized to cover the administrative costs per administrative rule and we cannot put stipulations on requests.

Motioned by Olson, seconded by Boyd TO AUTHORIZE THE LICENSE LIST REQEUST. Roll call vote: Boyd-yes; Dennert-yes; B. Jensen-yes; G. Jensen-yes; Olson – yes; Phillips-yes; Peterson-yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Commission's Role in the Spearfish Canyon Land Acquisition Process

Secretary Hepler began the discussion explaining how GFP acquires land and assesses fees. Hepler also expressed the importance of the Commission and public having an active role in the land acquisition process.

Commissioner G. Jensen asked if the land acquisition process would be part of the master planning meeting scheduled for January 26th.

Secretary Hepler stated that the information will be presented to the panel, master planning staff and Commission prior to the meeting.

Commissioner Phillips inquired if GFP staff would be in attendance prior to the meeting to answer questions.

Secretary Hepler noted staff will be available before the meeting for questions.

Commissioner Peterson and Hepler thanked the Commissioners and panel members for assisting in the project.

Motioned by Phillips with second by G. Jensen TO ADJOURN THE MEETING. Motion carried unanimously and the meeting adjourned at 10:15 a.m.

Establish facility use fees for special events held at the Good Earth State Park visitor center and adjacent grounds.

Good Earth State Park visitor center - Classroom A, \$100 for 2 hours, \$200 for 4 hours, \$400 for 8 hours; Classroom B (includes kitchen), \$200 for 2 hours, \$300 for 4 hours, \$600 for 8 hours; Full Classroom (A and B), \$250 for 2 hours, \$450 for 4 hours, \$900 for 8 hours,

Non-Profit Rate for Good Earth State Park visitor center - Classroom A, \$30 for 2 hours, \$60 for 4 hours, \$120 for 8 hours; Classroom B (includes kitchen), \$60 for 2 hours, \$90 for 4 hours, \$180 for 8 hours; Full Classroom (A and B), \$75 for 2 hours, \$135 for 4 hours, \$270 for 8 hours.

Good Earth State Park picnic shelter - \$100 for 4 hours; and \$200 for all-day (6:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. from May 1 to September 30, exclusive, and 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. from October 1 to April 30, exclusive).

Good Earth State Park wedding event - include full classroom, amphitheater, picnic shelter, outdoor patio, and special one-day event park entrance license for guests, \$1,500 for 1-49 people, \$2,000 for 50-100 people, \$2,500 for 101-149 people, \$3,000 for 150-200 people.

Good Earth State Park wedding event (ceremony only) - picnic shelter or amphitheater and special one-day event park entrance license for guests for a maximum time of 2 hours, \$350 for 1-49 people, \$400 for 50-100 people, \$450 for 101-149 people, \$500 for 150-200 people;

SUPPORTIVE INFORMATION

State park areas are sought after sites for private gatherings and special events. Given its beautiful setting and close proximity to Sioux Falls, the Good Earth State Park Visitor Center facility will be a popular venue for events such as weddings, reunions and meetings. These special events will not be scheduled during times that would interfere with park programming and the primary public use of the visitor center facility. The fees take into consideration facility expenses, needed staff time and clean-up costs associated with the anticipated rental uses. The fees are comparable with prices for similar facility rentals in the Sioux Falls area.

Requirements and Restrictions:

1. Application for a license may be made by any resident hunter who has not been previously issued a mountain goat license.

2. Land operator preference is not applicable to these licenses.

3. Mandatory check of harvested mountain goat by a Conservation Officer or Department representative within 24 hours of kill.

Discussions around the topic brought the question forward whether these allowances should occur outside established season dates. Per the request of the Commission, the department brings forward a recommended change to rule which would include a provision where the secretary may authorize a person to hunt outside the established season dates if the person's illness has advanced to a point justifying that allowance.

- 2. Amend the size and configuration of the 'public swimming zone' on Lake Alvin in Lincoln County as follows:

- (a) The waters of Horse Creek Bay, commonly known as the North Marina, west <u>northwest</u> of a line beginning approximately 600 1200 feet east of the boat ramp on the north shoreline_and extending approximately in a straight line southwesterly to the opposing shoreline, are a "no wake zone";
- (b) The waters fronting on the <u>north</u> shoreline of Horse Creek Bay, extending out into the water approximately 150 feet, from a point on the shoreline <u>450 230</u> feet <u>northeast east</u> of the north swim beach comfort station, to a point <u>450 230</u> feet <u>southwest south</u> of the north swim beach comfort station, are a "public swimming zone":
- (c) The waters of the Spring Creek inlet south of a line beginning at a point approximately 300 450 feet northeast of the <u>south swimming swim</u> beach <u>parking lot comfort station</u> on the southeast shoreline of the bay and extending in approximately a straight line across the water to the opposing shoreline, are a "no wake zone";
- (d) The waters fronting on the <u>southeast</u> shoreline of the Spring Creek Inlet Bay, extending out into the water approximately 150 feet, from a point on the shoreline approximately 300 215 feet northeast <u>north</u> of the south swim beach comfort station to a point 300 180 feet southwest <u>northwest</u> of the south swim beach comfort station, are a "public swimming zone";
- (e) The waters of the bay on the southwest side of the Sheridan Lake Campground complex southwest of a line beginning at a point on the west point of the bay and extending approximately in a straight line southeasterly to the opposing shoreline on the east side of Calumet Point, are a "no wake zone":
- (f) The waters of Calumet Bay, commonly known as the South Boat Launch area, south of the section line dividing sections 12 and 13, township 1 south, range 5 east, a line beginning at a point 475 feet north of the boat ramp on the west shoreline of the bay, extending approximately in a straight line northwesterly to the opposing shoreline on the east shoreline of the bay, are a "no wake zone."
- 4. Add a 'no motors zone' on Lewis and Clark Lake in Yankton County as follows:

DEPARTMENT RECOMMENDATION

<u>Recommended change from proposal</u>: Modify proposed public water safety zone regulations for Sheridan Lake in Pennington County to adjust starting point for no wake zone in Sheridan Lake Horse Creek Bay or North Marina as follows:

41:04:02:51. Pennington County public water safety zones. Pennington County public water safety zones are as follows:

- (3) Sheridan Lake:
 - (a) The waters of Horse Creek Bay, commonly known as the North Marina, west <u>northwest</u> of a line beginning approximately 600 1240 feet east of the boat ramp on the north shoreline_and extending approximately in a straight line southwesterly to the opposing shoreline, are a "no wake zone";

SUPPORTIVE INFORMATION

1. The County Commission of Lake County has requested the Department propose a 'public swimming zone' on a portion of the Lake County Public Access Area located on the southwest corner of Lake Madison. This property is owned and managed by Lake County and provides important public access to the lake. The County Commission's primary concern in making this request is to ensure the public has a safe place to swim while maintaining other types of recreational use and access to the lake from this property.



Aerial of west half of Lake Madison with the county public access area highlighted in yellow








Proposed swimming zone – approximately 230 feet

2. With the increasing popularity of canoes, kayaks and paddle boards there has been a corresponding increase in the use of these small watercraft on Lake Alvin. No boats are allowed in the public swim zone, which currently comprises the entire maintained portion of the waterfront at Lake Alvin Recreation Area. Ideally, this rule change proposal would remove a small portion of the beach frontage (75 feet) on the east end and allow for a convenient place for visitors to launch these small watercraft legally near the day-use area and the associated parking lot of this park. Currently, many folks utilizing these small watercraft are trying to squeeze into this area since there is no other place to go. There would be approximately 350 feet of zoned swim beach left, which would be adequate for swimming use. The change would also more accurately describe the true dimensions of the beach. The Lake Alvin waterbody is entirely zoned a "no-wake zone".



3. The purpose of these amendments to the public water safety regulations on Sheridan Lake in Pennington County is to help clarify the locations of the public water safety zones. In addition, over the years the marina operator has entered into agreements with the US Forest Service allowing him to expand his docks and mooring areas and these regulation revisions will help ensure these facilities are located within the no wake zones as described.



GAME, FISH AND PARKS COMMISSION ACTION FINALIZATION

4. The purpose of this proposed "no motors zone" rule on **Lewis and Clark Lake** in Yankton County is to create a safe beach area for Resort guests to swim at, but still allow for the launch of canoes, kayaks, and paddle boards. In the past, there has been a conflict of uses between swimmers and motorized watercraft in this non-zoned beach area. This conflict has increased as the Resort occupancy has increased.

COMMISSION PROPOSAL

 Amend current administrative rule 41:04:05:14 for careless operation of a boat to appropriately address those instances of careless operation and define what careless operation of a boat is:

41:04:05:14. Careless boat operation <u>— careless operation defined</u>. A boat underway shall remain far enough away from other boats, swimmers, and persons on shore so as not to create an undue hazard by its wash or wake. The speed or operation of a boat must be reasonable for the time, place, and surrounding conditions. Unreasonable speed and water skiing are prohibited in harbors, near bathing beaches, docks, landings, piers, anchorages, anchored boats, or fishing boats. Speed is reasonable when it does not create an undue hazard or cause damage to others. No person may operate or allow the operation of any boat in a careless manner. Careless boat operation is defined as that which is done carelessly and without due caution, at a speed or in a manner so as to endanger any person or property, not amounting to reckless operation of a boat as defined in § 42-8-46.

2. Create a new administrative rule to address instances of eluding law enforcement by boat:

41:04:05:16.01. Eluding a law enforcement officer. Any operator of a boat who, after failing or refusing to bring a boat to a stop pursuant to § 41:04:05:16 or after having been given a signal by hand, voice, emergency light, or siren, flees from a law enforcement officer or attempts to elude the pursuit of a law enforcement officer is guilty of eluding.

DEPARTMENT RECOMMENDATION

Recommended changes from proposal: The department recommends the commission modify the current proposed language for careless boat operation as follows:

41:04:05:14. Careless boat operation <u>- careless operation defined</u>. A boat underway shall remain far enough away from other boats, swimmers, and persons on shore so as not to create an undue hazard by its wash or wake. The speed or operation of a boat must be reasonable for the time, place, and surrounding conditions. Unreasonable speed and water skiing are prohibited in harbors, near bathing beaches, docks, landings, piers, anchorages, anchored boats, or fishing boats. Speed is reasonable when it does not create an undue hazard or cause damage to others. No person may operate or allow the operation of any boat in a careless manner. Careless boat operation is defined as that which is done without due caution, at a speed or in a manner so as to endanger any person or property, not amounting to reckless operation of a boat as defined in § 42-8-46.

SUPPORTIVE INFORMATION

GAME, FISH, AND PARKS COMMISSION ACTION FINALIZATION

1. The current language in 41:04:05:14 is too specific and fails to capture the variability of what "careless operation" can encompass. A fine line exists between boat operation which can be considered reckless versus that which can be considered careless, with elements of each being closely related. Often it is the discretion of the officer in the field, taking into account all the circumstances involved, which leads to the determination of boat operation as being either reckless or careless.

Additionally, there have been cases were states attorney offices have been hampered by the current language and have had to forgo prosecution of certain instances involving actions that were clearly careless by certain boat operators. Amending the current rule as proposed will both offer officers the better use of discretion to address those incidents that fall under careless operation, while at the same time allowing for states attorneys to more effectively prosecute those boat operators that have operated in manners determined to be careless.

2. Currently there is no state law or regulation to specifically address an operator of a boat that chooses to flee or elude law enforcement. There have been a number of incidents where our officers have attempted to stop a boat for a violation and the boat operator chooses to flee and engage our officers in a pursuit. Adopting the proposed language will allow our officers and other law enforcement officers in South Dakota the ability to properly address and prosecute those operators who decide to flee or elude law enforcement by boat.

COMMISSION PROPOSAL

1. Create a new rule, 41:10:04:06. "Containment waters." to identify specific waterbodies that are infested with aquatic invasive species which are likely to spread to other waters.

- Create a new rule, 41:10:04:07. "Local boat registries." to authorize the department to
 create local boat registries at containment waters to provide reasonable opportunities for
 boaters to comply with regulations and to slow the spread of aquatic invasive species from
 containment waters.
- Create a new rule, 41:10:04:08. "Decontamination required residual water present." to require that boats that have been used at a containment water and retain one or more gallons of water after plug removal, and are not part of a local boat registry for that water, must be decontaminated before the next launch.
- 4. Create a new rule, 41:10:04:09. "Decontamination required moored boats." to require that boats that have been moored for three or more consecutive days on a containment water, and are not part of a local boat registry for that water, be decontaminated before the next launch.
- 5. Modify 41:10:04:02. "Aquatic invasive species restrictions." to provide exemptions to AIS possession and transportation restrictions for participants in a local boat registry and for businesses trained by the department in watercraft inspection and decontamination.
- 6. Modify 41:10:04:03. "Watercraft restrictions." to allow boats in a local boat registry to launch into containment waters in accordance with the provisions of the registry.

DEPARTMENT RECOMMENDATION

Recommended changes from proposal: Modify proposed rule 41:10:04:09. "Decontamination required – moored boats." to require the decontamination of boats where any part of the boat has been continuously in a containment water for three or more days.

SUPPORTIVE INFORMATION

- 1. The transport of water or Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) from infested waters is the primary vector for the spread of AIS. Establishment of a containment water list will facilitate promulgation of rules to require decontamination of boats that have been in containment waters and still contain water, in an effort to limit the movement of AIS.
- 2. The creation of local boater registries will allow the department to permit authorized users of Containment Waters to transport and possess AIS according to provisions established for each local boat registry. The purpose of the registries is to provide reasonable opportunities for watercraft users to comply with AIS regulations and track the movement of potentially infested watercraft.

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GAME, FISH, AND PARKS COMMISSION ACTION FINALIZATION

- 3. Watercraft equipped with tanks that cannot be fully drained present the greatest risk of movement of AIS to other waters. Decontamination of these compartments will reduce the risk of introduction of undetectable and microscopic life stages of AIS to other waters.
- 4. It is highly probable that watercraft moored in "Containment Waters" for three or more continuous days will have AIS attached or present on the hull or in boat compartments. Decontamination of these areas is required to adequately remove the AIS and reduce the risk of movement to other waters.
- 5. Exemptions to AIS transportation and possession restrictions for participants in a local boater registry and for businesses approved by the department to decontaminate boats are necessary to facilitate the operation of the local boat registry and for boat decontamination or repair.
- **6.** An allowance for participants in a local boat registry to launch their watercraft with AIS attached or onboard back into the water in which the boat is registered is necessary to facilitate the operation of the local boat registry.


Background Information

The South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks Commission authorized the Department of Game, Fish and Parks to create and enforce the provisions of a local boat registry on certain waters classified as 'Containment Waters'. The purposes of the local boater registry are to help prevent the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) and to provide reasonable, but limited accommodations for watercraft operators allowing them the ability to more easily comply with AIS regulations.

Local boat registry participants can elect to enroll annually in this program which will provide them with limited exemptions to specific AIS transportation and possession regulations and afford them additional options regarding AIS decontamination requirements. However, in order to prevent AIS from spreading from the containment water, any boat that is included in the registry will be restricted from certain activities unless the boat is decontaminated.

Transportation Zone

The Transportation Zone for the Lewis & Clark Lake Boater Registry is outlined on the map below. This area was selected since it includes the city of Yankton and nearby rural areas while excluding nearby lakes in a further effort to help prevent the introduction of Zebra Mussels to those waterbodies. Boundaries may be amended in future years, as necessary, to reduce the likelihood of spreading AIS. The exemptions from AIS transportation and possession regulations granted under this program do not apply to interstate transport. The Federal Lacey Act prohibits the interstate transport of Zebra Mussels, and the provisions of the Lewis & Clark Lake Local Boater Registry do not apply in other states. Boats transported outside this area must be decontaminated and free of AIS.















Benefits to Local Boat Registry Participants

- 1. Registered boats may be transported within the Transportation Zone without completing decontamination prior to the next launch back into Lewis and Clark Lake
- 2. Registered boats with Zebra Mussels attached or on board may be transported or stored within the Transportation Zone.
- 3. Registered boats that are equipped with ballast tanks (e.g. wakeboard boats) may be transported within the Transportation Zone without completing decontamination prior to the next launch.
- 4. Registered boats that are stored in Lewis and Clark Lake for three or more consecutive days may be transported within the Transportation Zone without completing decontamination prior to the next launch.

Restrictions on Boat Transportation

- 1. Registered boats may not be launched into any waterbody except Lewis & Clark Lake without completing a decontamination.
- 2. Registered boats may not be transported outside the Transportation Zone without completing a decontamination.
- 3. Each registered boat will be issued a boat log to document the date, location and method of decontamination used if the boat will be transported outside the Transportation Zone or launched in another waterbody.
- 4. Each registered boat will be issued a Lewis & Clark Lake Boat Registry Decal that must be affixed next to the boat registration sticker.

Eligibility

Participation in the registry is voluntary and operators of registered boats must comply with all provisions of the Lewis & Clark Lake Local Boater Registry. Participants who violate the provisions of this Program will be subject to prosecution. There is no limit to the number of boats that may be registered to a person; however, only the legally licensed and registered owner of the boat may apply.

Any resident of the state of South Dakota may participate in the Lewis & Clark Lake Local Boater Registry.

Any non-resident with a boat that is licensed and registered in the state of South Dakota may participate in the Lewis & Clark Lake Local Boater Registry.

















Lewis and Clark Lake Local Boat Registry Application
